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Program flow for each lesson (Plan)

Mizunami Let's get together using Japanese

A course of five lessons will be held in the Inazu and Sue districts (content of the lessons is the same at either place)

Orientation	Group interaction Reflection Learning basic Japanese
Orientation	Explanation given about the lesson plan for that day
Group interaction	Small group conversation about the topic of that day  Lesson topic self introduction/one's hometown/hospital, injury/recycle
Reflection	Reflecting on today's learning
Learning basic Japanese	Learning useful expressions that can be used in daily life



©<u>Use "easy to understand" Japanese</u>

Speak clearly / finish sentences / use short sentences / communicate with expressions and gestures / use pictures and illustrations whenever possible

#### Definition of "easy to understand" Japanese

It means using simpler, easier to understand Japanese expressions. Not all learners are English speakers. Also, even if Japanese is spoken slowly or is repeated over and over again, it is of no use if the learner does not understand the meaning of the vocabulary to begin with. Therefore, employing "easy to understand" Japanese will get the message across more effectively.
